### 2004-2005 ANNUAL REPORT: A YEAR OF FOUNDATION

The 2004-2005 school year was one of building renovation, of physically moving our operations, and of laying a new foundation for the future. There were actually two foundations laid this year: one for the new O'Neill Sea Odyssey Building, and a financial foundation to secure the future of our program.

In the school year, 155 classes, with over 4,000 youth, were served. Some classes were conducted in a temporary trailer on the west side of the Harbor, before we moved back into our new education center in the renovated O'Neill Sea Odyssey Building. We won two major statewide awards, developed new partnerships, and - thanks to generous donations from our Board of Directors - started an endowment fund at the Community Foundation of Santa Cruz County. While measurable progress for our Five Year Strategic Plan was on target, O'Neill Sea Odyssey also spent this school year plotting an audacious plan to serve more kids, and to serve some in new and different ways.

**Moving Day:** On September 27, 2003, employees of Starbucks, O'Neill Incorporated, and several volunteers - 75 people in all - had moved our program out of the old O'Neill Building near the east Harbor jetty and into a trailer on the US Coast Guard's basketball court on the Harbor's west side. The temporary site was known as Camp Laird, in honor of State Assemblymember John Laird's success in securing funding for the temporary trailer, the new building's elevator and for revenue lost during building renovation. Camp Laird is where most of our work with youth was done during the 2003-2004 school year. In 2004-2005, most of our work was done in our new Education Center, where we will be for at least 25 years, and probably the next 50 years.

**Celebrating A New Learning Center:** By August 1, 2004, Starbucks Coffee employees and OSO volunteers had moved OSO into its new space and on October 14, an Open House in honor of Assemblymember Laird raised over \$10,000 for the program. Among those feted at the event were the original building donors Jack O'Neill and Harry Hind, cornerstone building donors, the Santa Cruz Port District which owns the land beneath the building and its downstairs, and the building team, consisting of the Port District's Brian Foss, Devcon Construction's

Every year, O'Neill Sea Odyssey commissions an independent evaluation in order to gauge how well the kids benefit from our program. For the 2003-2004 school year, we received ratings of 3.97-3.99 out of a high score of 4, indicating that our program is very effective at accomplishing its purpose of creating future generations of ocean stewards.

This would not be possible without the hard work, focus, and creativity of OSO's staff and Board of Directors. In particular, our crew and our skippers, who have taken over 1,000 trips out of the Harbor channel, deserve credit for this accomplishment. Executive Director Dan Haifley keeps the program funded, its quality on track, and our Board of Directors organized. Tim O'Neill and Mike Egan work very hard to keep the kids safe, and the crew together. Teamwork among the crew is essential to the success of the program.

Education Coordinator Laura Barnes, who is an instructor and coordinates the curriculum; and Cheryl Thompson, who schedules the classes, keeps our books, and keeps the organization's records, are both integral to keeping things moving forward. We have a brilliant crew who teach complicated subjects, operate the boat, and serve to keep the kids happy all at the same time. These individuals include Adam Steckley, Nikki Brooks, Steve Spiliotopolous, Kat Burrows, Chelsea Phillips, and Lauren Hanneman.

We focus on 4th through 6th grade kids because they are impressionable, and the impressions they receive make a greater impact when the subject matter is taught in a stimulating environment. The Team O'Neill catamaran, the Monterey Bay, and our ocean-front education center provide the backdrop for learning that gives these kids a gift that lasts for generations. The gift is one of stewardship, for our oceans and our communities. Our oceans provide 80% of the world's oxygen, and we have got to take care of it. It is vital to our existence. Many thanks to the team that makes it work!

*O'Neill Sea Odyssey (OSO)* engages 4th - 6th grade youth with lessons in navigation, sailing, conservation, and marine science on a 65-foot catamaran sailing Monterey Bay, and in a shore-side education center. The program is free, and each group completes a community service project to participate. ***Our mission is to provide a hands-on educational experience to encourage the protection and preservation of our living sea and communities.*** OSO offers a stimulating environment in which students learn practical applications for the subject matter, including geography, mathematics, natural science, and conservation.

Since 1996, OSO has served 30,000 youth from over 1,000 school classes, community centers, and youth groups. The curriculum is aligned with California State and Federal education standards in science and mathematics, and in December 2004 the program received the California Governor's Environmental and Economic Leadership Award in Children's Environmental Education.

You can support *O'Neill Sea Odyssey's* work in the following ways:

The loss of Gary Garmann (pictured right) in late January of 2005 was felt deeply by the building team, and by O'Neill Sea Odyssey staff who worked closely on the project.



**Education Center Renovation and Fund Drive:** The building renovation, a joint project of the Santa Cruz Port District and O'Neill Sea Odyssey, was initially hampered by a rainy winter. The project was fundamentally complicated by heavy damage to the original building being in an oceanfront environment for over 40 years. In particular there had been damage to the foundation, and the building's structural beams. Hard work, budget tightening, and creative ways to speed the construction schedule won the day, as portions of the building were occupied on August 1. O'Neill Sea Odyssey is now raising the final funds needed to pay for the non-profit's portion of the building, which includes a beautiful education center and revenue-generating tenant space.

**Endowment:** After more than a year of careful planning, OSO's Board of Directors voted to begin an endowment fund with the Community Foundation of Santa Cruz County. The Foundation, which can work with donors outside the County, has \$30 million in endowed assets and is experienced in prudent financial management while providing a healthy return for the organizations it supports. OSO Board members contributed the funds to establish the endowment, which can receive gifts of cash, stock, real estate and can utilize charitable annuities to secure OSO's future.

**Struve Slough To The Sea:** OSO entered into a partnership with Watsonville Wetlands Watch for a two-day program for four Watsonville-area classes. The Nature Restoration Trust, a partnership between PG&E and the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation, funded OSO's participation. Watsonville Wetland Watch's participation was funded by the California Coastal Commission. 120 Watsonville youth spent late winter and spring restoring Struve Slough and sailing Monterey Bay, learning first hand about the flow of water from wetland to ocean, and learning how community efforts can keep that water clean.

**Adam Webster Fund:** The Adam Webster Fund served 4 classes with 62 individuals with cognitive and physical challenges. The vision of the fund, as articulated by Tom and Judy Webster, is to provide an experience that goes beyond the academic, beyond the experiential, and focuses on the same thrill experienced by their son Adam when he would sail with them on their own boat: the rolling of the waves, the taste of the salt air, and the experience of the ocean.

**Future Partnerships:** In 2001 and 2002, OSO worked with a number of other organizations to develop multi-day programs to encourage environmental stewardship. Education Coordinator Laura Barnes developed a plan, approved by the Board, to serve more kids in new and more creative ways. When it approved the 2005-2006 budget, our Board of Directors also agreed to increase the number of classes it will serve this year due to increasing demand for our program.

**Awards:** In December 2004, OSO received the California Governor's Environmental and Economic Leadership Award for Children's Environmental Education, and at our May 26 Open House we received Senator Barbara Boxer's Conservation Champion Award. In January, Watsonville Mayor Ana Ventura Phares recognized our program during a City Council meeting.

**Stylin Recyclin:** O'Neill Sea Odyssey's Board of Directors had to make the sad decision to close the Stylin Recyclin store after close of business on February 13, 2005. This was a very difficult decision, but after five years of trying, the store was not able to support itself financially, much less provide financial support for our program for area youth. Stylin Recyclin did achieve its goal of recycling quality clothing, books, sportswear and other items and thereby protecting the environment. We wish to express our deep appreciation to the staff and volunteers who have done so much, and to the many, many donors and shoppers who have supported the store.

**Financial stability:** While our support from government and foundation sources is certain to decrease, our Board and staff are working to build our support from individuals. ## OPEN HOUSE: TEACH OUR CHILDREN WELL

O'Neill Sea Odyssey celebrated the milestone of educating its 30,000th student with an Open House held at the education center on Thursday, May 26. The celebration began just before sunset, with more than 150 good friends, newcomers, former students, volunteers, staff, board members, sponsors and dignitaries in attendance.

After an hour of mingling and introductions, the formal presentations began. Master of Ceremonies for the evening was Nick Petredis, OSO Board Secretary. After welcoming the crowd, Nick introduced Ms Jennifer Tang, who was representing Senator Barbara Boxer. After a short speech (see sidebar), Ms. Tang recognized OSO with a Conservation Champion Award and presented the award to OSO's founder and board chair Jack O'Neill. Equally moving, Ms. Michelle Lew presented Jack a Senate Resolution on behalf of State Senator Joe Simitian (see side bar). Also attending were Santa Cruz County Supervisors Mark Stone and Ellen Pirie, and Scotts Valley City Councilmember Cliff Barrett.

With two new honors in hand, Jack O'Neill remarked with pride, "This program has moved beyond my wildest dreams, and I am so excited about the future. This ocean is alive, and we've got to protect it."

Additionally, a special moment during the presentation was a short speech made by 13-year-old OSO student Elizabeth Sprinkle. With poise she recalled her first trip with OSO, learning about the ocean and the life within it. Elizabeth said, "My little brother also participated in the Sea Odyssey, and I am so grateful that this program can continue on for kids who are younger than me!" The crowd was also entertained by stories from the early days of OSO from Jim Thoits, OSO Leadership Committee. Jim brought home a serious message, that while the O'Neill family provides cornerstone support for the program, the community must help out in a big way if the program is to meet growing demand from area schools & community centers.

## BOXER STATEMENT AND SIMITIAN RESOLUTION

**Below are excerpts of the statement by U.S. Senator Barbara Boxer upon presenting the Conservation Champion Award, and from the Senate Resolution authored by State Senator Joe Simitian:**

**Senator Boxer:** I established my Conservation Champion Award in 2000 to recognize individuals and organizations in California who are working to promote a safe and healthy environment. His concern for the environment led him to start OSO as a way to protect this precious resource for future generations. ## A PLACE OF REFUGE, WONDER, AND KIDS -

As a place of refuge, the Santa Cruz Harbor is special to those who spend time on the sea. To these outward-bound souls, the Harbor is the place to which they return. It is where their investments, their dreams, and their memories are kept safe until the next adventure.

For the kids of O'Neill Sea Odyssey, the Santa Cruz Harbor is a place of wonder. For most, it is where their first adventure to the sea will begin. It is a place where the backpack containing the peanut butter sandwich and school supplies rest as the learning adventure on the Team O'Neill catamaran begins.

As the 65-foot vessel winds around the Santa Cruz Wharf loaded with 35 excited kids, a busy teacher and a few lucky parents, those backpacks will rest at the O'Neill Sea Odyssey education center, in full view from the waters off Seabright Beach, just behind the Walton Lighthouse.

This Harbor of wonder will be the best classroom these kids have ever seen. Combined with their time on the water, the Santa Cruz Harbor will reveal what few textbooks can.

On the Team O'Neill catamaran and in the O'Neill Sea Odyssey education center, the children learn navigation (shhh! don't tell them it's really geometry), marine science (catching plankton and learning that it starts the bottom of the food chain), and ecology (natural science, basic zoology and the watershed).

These kids get quality hands-on learning from three instructors, in groups of ten. The best part is, the teacher who signed up for this free class gets curriculum that aligns with California State Standards, and has received an award from California's Governor in environmental education.

Around the Harbor, you could spend days learning from its interpretive displays, and from the stories of fishermen, boaters, surfers, kayakers, harbor business people and employees, and the locals. It is a treasure chest of natural wonders, human drama, old fashioned fun, and several business transactions each minute. In addition, there are the smiles of happy children.

The majority of O'Neill Sea Odyssey's kids come from outside the area, and from schools that serve low and moderate income youth. This is possible because the program is free of charge to the schools, community centers, and the kids it serves. Each group that participates must complete a community service project, and they must work with O'Neill Sea Odyssey to integrate the program into their class curriculum.

*This article will appear in a book about the Santa Cruz Harbor to be published next fall or winter. Produced by Gus Gregory, Joyce Wrenn and Dave Clark, proceeds from the book will benefit O'Neill Sea Odyssey. Watch for more details over the coming months.*

In addition, there are the special needs kids who are served by the Adam Webster Memorial Fund. These children are able to learn, but in different ways. In many cases they are able to experience O'Neill Sea Odyssey through the smell of the salt air, the roll of the ocean, and the excitement of the sail. Like the namesake of the fund whose parents Tom and Judy keep the effort alive, the youth will identify the ocean as a milestone in their lives, a place to record a special and enduring experience.

There are also the kids who will remember their multi-day experiences at the Harbor thanks to the partnerships O'Neill Sea Odyssey develops, providing further insight into the ocean, watersheds, science and community service.

Imagine that - generations of youth that otherwise would not experience the ocean get the experience of a lifetime on the ocean - and in the Santa Cruz Harbor. The Harbor truly is the gateway to the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary. It is also the gateway to learning and environmental stewardship for the next generation.

The end result is worthwhile. O'Neill Sea Odyssey creates a generation of ocean and watershed stewards. O'Neill Sea Odyssey brings academic subjects to life. O'Neill Sea Odyssey introduces the ocean to kids who otherwise will have never experienced it.

Without the support of the community, generous donors, the O'Neill family and the Santa Cruz Harbor, our program would not be possible. O'Neill Sea Odyssey is grateful to be the ocean's ambassador to the next generation.
